## GREAT MUNSTER CATTLE AND SHEEP FAIR.

The Great Munster Cattle and Sheep Fair was held yesterday, and though not quite as large as the previous fair, business was brisk, and prices advanced on an average about £2 per head over the late rates, and buyers were anxious to pick up forward condition stock. The tone of the market was decidedly improved, despite the existing lack of transit facilities. Beef realised from 47s to 50s per cwt; three year old bullocks went from £21 to £25 per head; three year old heifers fetched from £18 to £23; two year old bullocks sold at from £13 to £16, and two year old heifers from £12 to £14 each. Yearlings made from £8 to £11 apiece. Milk cows realised from £20 to £26, and mutton, which was scarce, was sold at 1s 2d per lb on foot.

## DEATH OF REV FR. McGOVERN, O.P.

We regret to announce the death, which took place unexpectedly at the Priory, Dominick street, on Thursday night, of the Rev. John McGovern, O.P. The deceased clergyman, who was in his 85th year, was educated at Tullagh, and after reading a distinguished ecclesiastical course, was ordained in Cork thirty years ago. He was a native of Lisnasea, Co. Fermanagh, and served on the mission in Trinidad, West Indies; Waterford, Dundalk, and Limerick. He was a zealous and devoted priest, and in Limerick he was held in the greatest esteem and affection by his brethren and a large number of lay friends and acquaintances.

On Monday Office and Requiem High Mass will be sung in the church for the repose of the deceased clergyman.

After Requiem Mass at 11 o'clock this morning the remains of the late Fr McGovern were interred in the crypt attached to the Priory. Rev Fr Smith, O.P., read the burial service, and gave the final absolution. The other clergy present were—Rev Fr Collins, O.P.; Rev Fr Dwan, Adm., St Michael's, and Rev Fr Kiernan, O.P.

### Soldier Wounded.

While attempting to escape from Mary-street barrack on Thursday night, where he was in detention, Volunteer Sean Walsh, National Army, was fired on by the troops and wounded. He received a compound fracture of the right femur, caused by a rifle bullet. He was taken to Barrington's Hospital, where he was treated by the House Surgeon, and later removed to the Co. Infirmary, where he was detained. Walsh is a native of Pennywell, and aged eighteen years. His condition is somewhat critical.
