THE CITY HOUSING SCHEME.

At the meeting of the Corporation Housing Committee last night, Mr T Bourke, Deputy Mayor, presiding, it was decided to advertise for tenders for the erection of twenty-eight houses on the Garryowen site, under the Housing Acts. The Corporation have already in hands the building of twelve houses in Nicholas-street, and the proposed undertaking of twenty-eight will leave twenty-six more to be erected under the recent scheme.

THE SUGAR TAX.

In the British House of Commons, defending his refusal to reduce the tax on sugar, the Chancellor said he reviewed the world situation regarding sugar production, and declared that if he were to reduce the sugar tax now the whole amount of the reduction would go straight to New York.

THE BEER DUTY.

In a leading article on the reduction of the tax on beer, the "Daily Express" says:—The brewers, in spite of the previous protestations, did agree to pay part of the reduction, if less than was anticipated. Their contribution of one-sixth of the reduced Excise is well within their capacity to pay without serious diminution of their profits. The remission of tax is applied by barrel in bulk, and not by standard barrel. This is a reversal of Mr Austin Chamberlain's mistake in the Budget of 1920. It gives a penny a pint reduction to every class of beer, and puts an end to the policy which made the watering of the national beverage of the cheaper sort a source of private revenue.

The death took place at the Presentation Convent, Sexton-street, on Tuesday night, of Mother Mary Catherine Irwin, after a brief illness. The deceased religious was daughter of the late Mr William Irwin, Feenagh House, Charleville, and was in her 77th year. She had been nearly half a century a member of the Presentation Community.


Sudden Death in America.
