The Deputy Mayor—It is suggested that we ask the intervention of the Papal Envoy in this matter, otherwise we cannot have an amnesty. I regret to say Mrs. O'Callaghan is very ill.

Mr. O'Brien—I need not say that I regret her illness, but that is brought about by her own actions.

The Deputy Mayor—She is a very poor subject for hunger-striking.

Mr. O'Brien observed that it had been asked why she was arrested. Well, everyone knew that she was a member of a government opposed to the Government. If that was not sufficient reason for her arrest, then he did not know what was. There were only three others of that government still at large, and it was the most natural thing in the world that Mrs. O'Callaghan should be arrested. He was not in favour of appealing to the Government on her behalf.

The Deputy Mayor—Ever since the murder of her husband she has been in poor health.

It was ultimately decided, on the motion of Ald. Casey, to make representation to Monsignor L. on behalf of Mrs. O'Callaghan and the other hunger strikers, with a view to having the hunger strike ended pending his Excellency's intervention in the interests of peace.

There is no doubt that the cave had a rendezvous of these armed men for a considerable time. It was found to have been recently and otherwise equipped, but the supplies and water had been exhausted, and the men were confronted with the choice between starvation, surrender, or breasting the rocks. There was no exit inland from the cave.

A priest arrived on Wednesday and volunteered to attempt the dangerous descent to the cave, in order to induce the besieged to surrender. The troops assured the priest they would not fire during his descent or but they could not see their way to go down him. The priest did not go down.

The survivors bore traces of fatigue, hunger, and illness. They said they ran short of food and had to drink seawater. The troops brought them to the nearest farmhouse, and the refreshments.
