CUNARD LINE.

The sailing of the popular Cunard liner "Caronia" on Saturday afternoon last from Liverpool to New York marked the resumption of the Company's five o'clock sailing hour arrangements. In pre-war days this was greatly appreciated by Atlantic travellers. It enabled passengers from practically all parts of the country to remain at home until the morning of sailing. The new arrangement will apply in future to all steamers engaged in the Company's well known services between Liverpool/Queensdown and New York, and Liverpool/Queenstown and Boston. In the former service the "Caronia" will be associated with her equally popular sister ship the "Carmania" and the great new sports ship "Franconia" which is scheduled to make her maiden voyage on June 23rd next. The Boston service will be maintained by two new ships, "Boythia" and "Samarita," both of which provide the acme of comfort in ocean travel.

DEATH OF MR T. O'CONNELL.

The death took place at his residence, Eanis Road, yesterday morning after a prolonged illness of Mr Thomas O'Connell, late city water superintendent. The deceased had attained his seventieth year, and was elected to the position of water superintendent twenty-three years ago, prior to which he was employed in the locomotive department of the then Waterford and Limerick Railway Company. With two other employees he took a prominent part in the agitation against amalgamation with the Great Southern and Western Railway Company, and was obliged to leave the service. The funeral took place this evening for Mount St Lawrence Cemetery.

MR JAMES LARKIN RETURNS TO DUBLIN.

After nearly nine years' absence, Mr James Larkin, the General Secretary of the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union, returned to Ireland yesterday. Thousands of people thronged the precincts of Westland Row Station at eight o'clock, when the boat train arrived, and the streets were so congested that it was with some difficulty that the brake in which Mr Larkin rode made its way to Liberty Hall, where he delivered an address.
