The following appears in a Buenos Aires contemporary: — With deep regret we announce the demise of Mr William O. Stokes, the popular and much respected Superintendent of the Missions to Seamen Institute, Calle Sau Juan, 234 Bueros Aires. The deceased passed away unexpectedly vesterday morning, at the lustitute, and the news of his death will be generally lamented by his numerous friends of the British Merchant Service. 'Paddy,' as his friends termed him, was born in Limerick 43 years ago, and he certainly proved himself to be a true son from the City of the Broken Treaty, Generous and goodhearted, he assisted many a stragglar or dead-beat on the road whereon hope can be found, and his ohanity and his faith in frail humanity recognised no limit or border line.
