He has had holiday deliveries served on business houses generally being late, but he proposes to consider of restoring the Good Friday also the night mail on the same day. Rural letter deliveries have been a scale "out of all proportion to requirements" of a scattered population. It is proposed to restrict only in the delivery days the people would be satisfied of obtaining their letters at a fixed time, free of charge. The P.M.G. has much hope for the restoration of the service, not yet resumed in Great Britain, and went on to observe that "if we pay to the clamour for the restoration of the service, evening deliveries, reduction of rates, and all the other demands, our cost would exceed two million pounds per annum, however, satisfactory to learn that before any restrictions are made, careful consideration will be given to the requirements of the business."

Great Annual Bull Sale.

This annual fixture, being the 50th anniversary was held by Mr Wm B. Fitt, Auctioneer, Paddock, Limerick, on last Tuesday. The sale was heavier than other years, the number being 230. There was an extremely large and representative attendance. Useful animals, both yearlings and two-year-olds were in request, and met with customers at full values. The top price for a yearling was obtained by Mr P. O'Brien, particularly good stamp, at 60 guineas, the yearling being Mr P. O'Brien. In the yearling class the top price went to Mr W. Gleeson at 40 guineas. Average rates would be, for two-year-olds from 28 to 36 guineas; second class, 14 to 20 guineas; Best yearlings, 24 to 28 guineas; and third class, 20 guineas. The sale worked out highly satisfactorily with a good clearance.

LAND FOR LABOURERS.

Yesterday Inspectors from the Irish Commission visited Clarina with a view to making arrangements for the taking over of three acres of land, the property of the late Mr. Clarke, for distribution amongst the agricultural labourers in the locality.
