the small salling vessels to the nig ocean-going steamers that have for a long time been coming to the port, one of the most important distributing centres in this country. In this connection the proposed line counciling the terminus with the locks is of great importance for the development of our trade and commerce. The subject of the railway link is not a new one. On the ocutrary it has been on the tapic from time to time for years past, and it can only be hoped now that in due course it will materialise successfully. The Committee's report on these two important projects will be awaited with more than ordinary interest.

Registrar-General's Report.

The births and deaths registered in the Dublin Registration Area and in eleven provincial Urban Districts of the Irish Free State, with the annual rates per 1,000 of the population represented thereby, which, for the purposes of these returns, is setimated at 666,256, are given in Table I of the Registrar-General's report for week ending Saturday, 19th May. The births are represented by 27 l in the Dublin Registration ares; Cock, 45 6; Limerick, 24'4; Waterford, 30'4 The deaths from all causes apper-30'4 The deaths from all causes apper-taining to the undermentioned areas for last week and for the past four weeks, respec-tively, were equal to the following annual rates per 1,530 of the population :- Twelve Town Districts, 16'3 and 15'2; Dublin Registration Area, 172 and 153; Dublin City, 191 and 163; Cork, 16'3 and 14'5; Limerick, 230 and 19'6; and Waterford, 15'2 and 7'6. The deaths from cartain epidemic diseases registered in the 12 town districts during last week were equal to an annual rate of 1.6 per 1,000. Among the 17 deaths from all causes for Limerick are 4 from messies, two from whooping oungh, and one from d'ph'herts.
