IMPORTED BACON IN ENGLAND.

The fall in the price of imported bacon, which ranges up to fourpence a pound in the retail shops, was, writes the London correspondent of the "Irish Times," explained by an importer to-day as being due to the great influx of the Danish product. In one week no fewer than 70,000 pigs appear to have been killed, and the sudden arrival of great quantities of mild-cured bacon affected prices owing to the difficulties of storing this variety of bacon. Prices for Irish and English bacon have not been greatly affected, and the housewife who insists upon Irish produce has not been tempted by the lower price at which the imported article has been obtainable. The slump is not expected to last more than a very short time, and as soon as the large consignments of Danish produce are consumed prices will recover to the normal level.

SUDDEN DEATH.

An old woman named Elizabeth Molloy, Cross Road, Thomondgate, died suddenly last evening. She collapsed unexpectedly while in her house, and expired in a short time. She was eighty years of age, and in the circumstances the Coroner did not consider an inquest necessary.
