A wedding took place at St. John's Cathedral half-past eleven, of Major-General, Commanding Claremorris, Lt. M. F. Hogan and Mrs. Mary Hughra, and Miss Mary of the late Mr. James F. Barry, Janeboro', Limerick. The ceremony was attended by a large number of contracting parties, was officiated by Fr. Louis Ryan, O.P., who read the Nuptial Mass, assisted by the Rev. Fr. Prendergast, Claremorris; Rev. Fr. Chaglaire, Limerick; Rev. Fr. St. John's Cathedral, and Fr. C. do. The bride, who was given away by her father, Mr. Barry, and was attended by Miss Creina Barry, sister; Miss B. McMahon.

The bridegroom was present at the Cathedral, Claremorris, G.O.C., Limerick, and Lt. D. Reynolds, G.O.C., Claremorris; Col. Austin Roche, do; Commandant, Lt. M. A. LAND BILL PASSED.

At Tuesday's Daily Session, on the motion of Mr. P. J. Hogan, the third reading of the Land Law (Commission) Bill, 1923, was agreed to.

At a special Court before Mr. J. Ledden, P.C., a motor driver named Daniel Shalloo, was charged by the Civil Guard with causing grievous bodily harm to two children named Sherin, and a man named Patrick McDonnell, at Annacotty, on Sunday night. The evidence was that while driving a motor car to the city the accused ran into a perambulator containing the children, and injured McDonnell, who was standing close by. The accused was remanded for a week.

Mr. Comyn said that morning an affidavit by Mr. John Power, solicitor, Kildala, was handed to them, in which Mr. Power stated he was acting as solicitor for the defendant John Fogarty, and was the deceased's legal adviser for some years; and on 4th January, 1921, he prepared his last will, which was executed by the deceased in his presence and in the presence of Mr. Patrick J. Ryan, C.E. Kilmallock. In accordance with the testator's directions, he (Mr. Power) took custody of the will, and had it in his safe till 22nd February, 1921, when the will was taken from him by force by four men, whom he did not know, one of whom, at least, was armed with a gun, and he had not seen the will since. He was able to prove the will from the instructions and records in his possession; and he did not prepare any subsequent will for the deceased, who by the will devised and bequeathed his lands of Gheglara and Ballisavenna and all his property to his son, John, subject to certain legacies on behalf of the other two defendants and his daughter, Anne Fogarty, appointing John Fogarty his residuary legatee and devisee.

Mr. Power (instructed by Mr. John Power), on behalf of the defendant, John Fogarty, who was about to apply for probate, asked to have the case adjourned.

The Master of the Rolls refused to adjourn the case, and granted the order for administration sought.
