

### CITY REVISION COURT.

At the close of the revision of the lists of Parliamentary and Local Government electors for this year,

The Town Clerk (Mr W. M. Nolan) stated that he had been asked by the officials concerned to convey to the Clerk of the Crown and Peace (Sir Francis Kearney) their appreciation of the kind and courteous manner in which he had acted towards them, unfailingly, during the course of the revision. Owing to the nature and great increase in the extent of the lists on this occasion, they required more than ordinary care and attention, and he (the Town Clerk) could say that never, during nearly 30 years' experience of revisions, had he seen the lists more carefully, or, he might say, more scrupulously, gone into, or a greater desire evinced of having them made as nearly perfect as it was possible to compile them. He realised that, with the revision, only part of Sir Francis Kearney's and his staff's work was completed, the principal part had yet to be gone through, and he was sure his first extended register, when finished, would reflect credit on all concerned.

Sir Francis Kearney thanked the Town Clerk and the officials associated with him for the great care taken by them in the preparation of the lists. Limerick being one of the four cities where the new form of Register under the recent Electoral Act applied, an enormous amount of work was thrown on those engaged in the preparation of the new Register, and the Limerick Borough Council was to be congratulated on having, at this juncture, such highly trained and skilful officials representing this important electoral area. Arduous as had his (Sir Francis) work been during the Revision, it had been, however, considerably lightened and made pleasant by the able assistance given to him by his old friend the Town Clerk, Mr Nolan, who throughout the entire sitting had been unremitting in his close attention to every detail, and whose services he found invaluable.

#### Rev James Daly, P.P., Kilkee.

The rev gentleman, who had been ill for a couple of months, was a brother of the late Mrs Clune, the Crescent. ### THE DEAD BISHOP.

## Removal of Remains to Cathedral.

### Impressive Cortège.

At 7 o'clock on Tuesday evening the remains of the late Catholic Bishop, Most Rev Dr Hallinan, were removed from the Bishop's House, Corbally, to St John's Cathedral, where they lay in state yesterday. There was an enormous concourse of citizens on the streets leading to the Episcopal residence, and while the sad procession passed through to the Cathedral all business was suspended in the city. It was an eloquent and touching tribute of respect to the memory of the distinguished Prelate and Churchman, and expressed in full the affectionate regard in which the Most Rev Dr Hallinan was held by the people of the city. Long before the remains were removed from the Palace, citizens of every class and creed lined the approaches to Corbally, and by the time it was under way the line of extended route was almost congested. In the procession every interest in the city was represented, the Corporation, Chamber of Commerce, Harbour Board, as well as Trades and Labour bodies, religious organisations and Societies and Confraternities, Civic Guard, military, and professional classes. While the procession was in progress the bells of Mount St Alphonse and St Mary's Cathedral rang out muffled peals, which added a note of sadness to the solemnity of the occasion. The procession, which wended its way through the principal streets, was headed by the members of the Third Order of St. Francis, followed by the clergy, secular and regular, who immediately preceded the hearse, after which walked the members of the St Vincent de Paul Society, Corporation, and other representative bodies. Next came, in order, a detachment of military officers headed by Major-General Brennan, G.O.C. Limerick Command. Then the boys of St Joseph's Orphanage, wearing mourning armlets, and behind them marched members of the Civic Guard under Chief Superintendent Dreen. The general public came next, and about seven thousand members of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family, men and boys, wearing ribbons and medals, preceded by their Spiritual Director, Rev Father Robinson, were at the end of the cortège.

The line of route was through A blunkard street, Bridge street, across Matthew Bidge, Rutland street, Patrik street, O'Donnell street, William street, Mulgrave street, and Cathedral Place. The side walks along the route were crowded with people, who uncovered their heads as the hearse passed.

On arrival at the Cathedral, the remains were received by Monsignor O'Donnel and the Cathedral clergy who recited the *De Profundis*, and Rosary and Litany. The coffin was placed on a catafalque in front of the High Altar.

The coffin bore the following inscription on the baseplate:
