Furnell, J.P., and Mrs Furnell, of Ballylough, Limerick. The deceased gentleman was a mining engineer by profession, travelled extensively, and had been home a few years ago. Deep sympathy is expressed with his relatives in their bereavement.

DEATH OF MR CHARLES JOHNSON.

The death occurred yesterday morning at his residence Parnell-street, of an old and esteemed citizen, Mr Charles Johnson. He was a member of the old Corporation, was a prominent Nationalist in his day, and an ardent follower of the policy of the late Mr John Redmond.

DEATH OF MR W. A. FORSYTHE.

We regret to record the death of Mr Wm Ambrose Forsythe, which occurred on Thursday at Cookstown, Co Tyrone, of which he was Postmaster. Mr Forsythe, who was a native of Limerick, spent many years in the local G.P.O., to which he was appointed in 1888. In 1919 he was appointed Postmaster at Kiliare, and two years later promoted to Cookstown. He was a most courteous and genial official, and the news of his premature demise has been heard of with deep regret by the Limerick staff and numerous other friends. Mr Forsythe was for several years a member of the Committee of the Shannon Rowing Club, and in his day was a prominent Rugby football player. There is deep sympathy with his widow, a Limerick lady, in her bereavement.

The remains are due to arrive in Limerick to-night by motor, and will lie in St Munchin's Church, where the funeral service will take place at 9 o'clock to-morrow (Sunday) morning.

THE NEW BISHOP OF TUAM.

As already announced in these columns the Bench of Bishops of the Church of Ireland have elected Very Rev John Orr, B.D, Bishop of Tuam, in succession to the late Right Rev Dr Ross. Dr Orr has been Dean and rector of Tuam for the past six years, having been appointed Chaplain to the Bishop of the diocese in 1917. The new Bishop is a B.A. Scholar and Exhibitions of Trinity College, Dublin. He has had a varied experience, having been curate at St John's, Sandymount, from 1909 to 1902, at Aghade and Ardoyne from 1902 till 1906, and at Dundalk from 1906 till 1910. He was appointed rector of St John's, Sligo, in 1912, after having ministered in Kilmaree and Ardagh.
