THURSDAY'S GALE.

Have in Waterford.

Maggie Lawlor, aged 15, Ferrybank, Waterford, was killed by a falling tree while gathering sticks on the Garraway estate on Thursday during the gale which swept over the area. The trunk fell on to her head, and she died within a few minutes.

Many other trees were blown down in the district; one of the houses of the Waterford Boat Club was demolished, and the debris spread about the railway line.

Telegraphic communication in places outside the city was very bad, and messages accumulated.

THEFT OF PORTER FROM RAILWAY

At a late hour at night the G.S & W Railway premises at Lixnaw, Co Kerry, were entered. A wagon containing several barrels of porter was broken into. Two of the barrels were broached and eight gallons extracted. On receiving information of the occurrence, Sergeant P Flynn, Civil Guards, Listowel, was soon on the scene, and made several arrests.

CITY BATHING FATALITY.

This morning James O'Grady, 14 years of age, living in Francis Street, while bathing in the Shannon at Arthur's Quay, with other youths, was accidentally drowned. It appears that the boy got into difficulties while in deep water and shouted for help, which was not forthcoming in time to save him. A buoy was thrown to him, but he missed it and disappeared. The body has not been recovered.

DEATH OF MR GEORGE HUTCHINSON.
