**BATON CHARGES IN TRAMORE.**

Disorderly scenes, culminating in baton charges and the discharge of revolvers shots, were enacted yesterday in Tramore. The trouble arose out of the arrest of a member of an excursion party by two members of the Civic Guard on duty in the town. The prisoner's companions attempted his rescue, and with a hostile crowd co-operating a bitter hand-to-hand struggle developed. The peace officers were eventually reinforced by men in plain clothes, and succeeded in keeping their aggressors at bay and their captive in custody. David Reale, Waterford, was struck by a bullet in the right knee.

**MEMORIAL TO IRISH PATRIOTS.**

President Cosgrave, unveiling a memorial to Arthur Griffith and Michael Collins in Leinster Lawn, Dublin, yesterday, in the presence of a

Mr John Cronin, B.C, presided, and outlined the programme of the Labour candidates who were seeking the votes of the people in the coming elections to Dail Eireann. He said that programme was comprehensive enough to secure better conditions for labour in this country. The candidates selected to contest the elections were men who had served the interests of their class well in the past, and by sending them to the native Parliament they would endeavour to secure legislative measures that would tend for the good of the country generally.

Mr Michael Keyes, who was introduced first as one of the candidates, received a very cordial reception. He said that labour had twelve months ago stood down in the interest of the nation, but it was now up to them to see that they had proper and inadequate representation in the Dail. If they believed in the labour programme it was their duty to support them at the polls. The programme they had drawn up was one that embodied many questions of importance, and it was only by sending a strong party to the Dail that they could ensure they would have attention and be given legislative effect. He claimed that the Labour Party was as national as any other party, and could help in giving the country that peace, security, and prosperity which it required. (Applause).

Mr P Clancy, another candidate, also addressed the meeting, as did Mr Seamus O'Brien, and Mr M J Murphy.

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks to the Chairman.

**East and West Limerick.**

The campaign in East Limerick is now in full swing, and it is evident that a large number of candidates will face the electorate. Mr P K Walsh and Mr John Nolan, two of the Cumann na nGaedheal candidates, addressed a successful meeting in Adare, and Mr P K Hogan and Mr B Laffan (Farmers party), spoke at Bruff.

The Cumann na nGaedheal candidates—Dr Hayes, T.D; J A Smyth, John Nolan, P K Walsh, and J Ludden—will speak at Newcastle West to-morrow, and later the entire party will address a meeting in Ballylanders at five o'clock.

The programme of reform suggested by the Federation is as follows:—The reduction by one-half of the number of licensed houses; total closing of licensed houses on Sundays, election days, and occasions of public excitement or danger; curtailment of the hours of opening on other days, and
