annual consumption would be 600,000 gallons less than the consumption for the year ending March '23, and 13 millions less than in the year ending March, 1922. It was quite obvious from these figures that there was no extra consumption, and that the allegation of wastage was, therefore, unfounded. Mr Lee attributes the increased consumption for the last three or four years to the fact that since then a complete new hot and cold water installation had been laid on, and that up to then the existing supply had proved altogether inadequate.

The Chairman—You have Mr Lee's assurance now that there is no underground wastage.

Dr Moloney—Yer. The need for water here is enormous, laundry, cleansing, flushing, bathing, and domestic uses.

The Chairman—What would you say would be the consumption in the laundry?

Dr Moloney—It is very considerable. Probably 1.5 of the total.

The Chairman—Then on a calculation for an initial expenditure of £150, as suggested by Mr Lee, we would save £93, annually.

Mr Hennessy—A very business-like proposition.
