

LARE MENTAL HOSPITAL FINANCE.

At the monthly meeting of the County Clare Mental Hospital Committee a resolution was adopted directing that a special meeting be held to consider the payment of debts. If at next meeting the financial condition of the Committee is such as not to warrant a continued maintenance of the institution, the Committee recommends that all patients be sent to their own homes, "as is evident the traders of County Clare cannot expect to support gratis the mentally deficient of the county." A copy of the resolution is ordered to be sent to the County Council.

The Association has asked his Honor to hear all claims since the 12th May last on the 27th instant, and those anterior to that date—from the truce on the 11th July, 1921—on the 13th November, with a recommendation that they be taken in the order of the alphabetical names of the solicitors engaged in same.

At the sitting of the Limerick Quarter Sessions Court this morning, Mr J. S. Gaffney, solicitor, mentioned to his Honor the proposal of the Bar Association relative to the hearing of claims for malicious injury in the city and county.

His Honor said before he could do anything he would have to consult the county solicitors.
