

Time Act is passed either in or the Irish Free State. It is a manifestly of the greatest good for the greatest number, and it remains to be seen how far the extension movement will go, but it has already found considerable support in the Press and elsewhere. "The Daily News," for instance, hopes that the Government means to secure the extension of the Act at both ends—from April to October—and "will not be led into yet another compromise by giving October and April."

**DISMAYED CO. LIMERICK MAN IN SAN FRANCISCO.**

**Great Engineering Achievement.**

It is of interest to record that the Hon. Michael O'Shaughnessy, the City Engineer for the City of San Francisco, and one of the most gifted Engineers, hails from the County of Limerick, being the son of the late Mr. O'Shaughnessy, of Jointer Cottage, near Glina, a son of both Mr B Laffan, Chairman Limerick County Council, and Mr P O'Shaughnessy, a member of the same Council since its formation in 1899 until within a few years ago. O'Shaughnessy having graduated at University College, Cork, took his departure almost immediately for the United States, where his engineering ability soon found an outlet. He has since crowned a long series of big achievements with the construction of the mammoth dam which furnishes the City of San Francisco with its water supply. The dam of this reservoir is the largest structure of its kind in the world, being 341 feet from foundation to crest, and is a fitting tribute to the genius of its designer. The dedication took the form of a public function some time ago, at which the Mayor of San Francisco, Mr James Rolph, and a group of distinguished citizens gathered at the dam-site, and was formally resolved:—"That as a monument to the great ability displayed in its construction, and to perpetuate in the years to come the memory of its builder, the structure shall be named and known hereafter as 'O'Shaughnessy Dam.'"

**NEW APPOINTMENT.**

**Censoring of Films in Ireland; Right of Appeal.**

It is officially announced that Mr James O'Shaughnessy has been appointed film censor by the Minister for Home Affairs. With the passing of the new law, some time ago, of the Censoring of Films, this office was created for the first time in Ireland. All films must, of course, be submitted to the Censor whose decision may, however, be appealed by an appeal board. The expenses of the censor's office are to be covered by the fees levied on film corporations which "rent" pictures to cinema proprietors.
