In the matter of road improvement both bodies are in hearty co-operation, and the demonstration of Modern Methods of Road Making and Repairing arranged to be held in Cork, should have a very important effect in focusing attention on this important question, one, indeed, in connection with which fresh legislation was quite recently indicated by the Government, amongst other important measures soon to be introduced in the Dail.
