THE EXPLOSION IN A GRATE AT GARRYOWEN.

Inquest on Victim.

On Eucadey evening, at Barringto, e Hospital, Mr JA MeNeise, Dity Coroner, held an inquest into the circumstances of John Hanley's death, the result of an explicion in a grate in deceased's house at Garryowen, on Saturday night.

man of the jury.

Superintendent Bracken represented the Civie

Garrett Hanlon, Waterworks, Garryowen, father of the deceased, gave evidence of identifiation, and stated that on Saturday night, at about nine c'elook, he was in bed, and heard an explesion, and out to the hell he found paident OM the deceased in his mother's arms. He was quite conscious and taid that one of his legs was gene. He did not say how the accident happened. The only thing witness sould say that the boy was burning old boots on a block fire. He could only surmise hat there was semething in the soal that ex-The grate was shattered, and it was from the particles of the grate that the boy received the greatest injuries. The boy was eighteen years of age and was a moulder's ar prenties. Mrs Hanlen, mother of the boy, said that on the

night of the occurrence, it being very cold, he said he would remain in, and she gathered some sticks and old beets lying about the house, and with some soal he lighted a fire in his bedroom. She heard an explosion and ran to the room and saw the deseased standing up, but he was desed and staggering. She took him in her arms and ran to the hall with him. She asked him was he hurs and what happened, and he said he did not know. He was alone in the room, after the fire had been lighted and until the explesion ecourred. she could throw no light on how the explaien occurred. He made no statement as to how it happened.

Sargeant O'Connell, C.G. John-treet, stated that the first intimation he had of the matter was seeing the account of an explecion at Garryewen on Monday's Limerick paper. He visited the place mentioned, and was shown into the form where the explosion took pl co. He found the fire-place, grate, and mantel-piece ecmpletely blown out. There was a small obest of drawers near the fire place, and it was perferated with metal, apparently port on of the broken grate. The room did not appear to have been interfered with lince the accident. He search defor explosives, and sould find mone. In his opinion, there must have been some explosive behind the grate before the fire was made in it, or that it was mixed with the fuel, with slack coal. He made it quiries from the meighbours and they could throw Do light on it.
Dr Wm Dunden, House Surgeon, Barrington's

Hospital, gave avid nee that John Hanlon was admitted to the hospital at 10 15 p.m cm Matur-day suffering from a compound fracture of the right leg and innumerable punctured and conface and head. He died at 1.15 a m on 27th (Quesday). The cause of death was shock and homogrhage as a result of the wounds. The two pieces of metal (produced) were removed from the logs.

A verdict was returned that the deceased died frem bamorrhage and shock, the result of wounds

The Fereman, Coroner, and Separintendent Bracken expressed condolence with the parents and relatives of the deceased.
