CURRENT COMMENT.

Unemployment.

The returns issued by the Department of Sistinties show that on the 3rd December the total number of persons registered for employment in the Irish Free Siste was 34,459, showing a decrease of 2,630 compared with the previous week. In Dublin the numbers were 19,845 and 1,377 respectively; Cork, 4,633 and 5,407; Limerick, 1,594 and 1,881; Waterford, 1,244 and 1,304.

Registrar-General's Report.

Registration Area and in eleven provincial Urban Districts of the Irish Free State, with the annual rates per 1,000 of the pepulation represented thereby, which for the purposes of these returns, is estimated at 666,366, are given in Table I of the Registrar-General's report for week anding December 1st. The births are represented by 23.0 in the Dublin Registration area; Cork, 25.3; Lisserick, 13.5; Waterford, 76. The deaths from all causes appertaining to the undermentioned areas for last yeek and for the past four weeks, respectively, were equal to the following annual rates per 1,000 of the population:—Twelve Town Districts, 14.9 and 14.2; Dublin Registration Area, 16.3 and 15.2; Dublin City, 17.4 and 16.1; Cark, 11.6 and 12.1; Limerick, 10.8 and 12.2; and Waterford, 30.4 and 20.4. The deaths from all essues for Waterford were from whooping cough.

PORTRAITS IN OILS.

Mayors Clancy and O'Callaghan.

Themas George Shaughnessy was born of Irish parents in Milwaukse in 1853. His forbears were natives of West Limerick. He was identified with the Canadian Pacific Railway throughout his career. In 1882 he was general purchasing agent, and subsequently became Assistant General Manager and then President. He was also President and Director of a number of railway companies directly or indirectly associated with the Canadian Pacific system. He was created Baron Shaughaesey of Montreal in 1916, and is associated by his only son, the hon Will am J. Shaughnessy, barrister, who was born in 1883.

A knighthood was conferred on him in 1901, and in 1916 he became Baron Shaughnessy "of Montres!, Dominion of Canada, and Ashford, Do Limerick,"
