 outstanding figure in the Church of Ireland. His
 connection with its ministry covered a period of
 more than half a century. He was elected Bishop
 of Cashel, Emly, Waterford, and Lismore in the
 year 1906, and took a deep interest in educational

 advocate. He resigned from the Episcopacy in
 1919 owing to advancing years, and was succeeded
 by the Right Rev Dr Miller.

CANON LEE, D.D.

We regret to record the death, which occurred
 in Dun Laoghaire (Kingstown) on Monday night,
 of Canon Joseph W. Lee, D.D. Rector of Ettagh
 and Killoolman, Diocese of Killaloe, after a long
 illness. The rev. gentleman was younger brother
 of the late Mr Samuel E. Lee and the late Mr
 B. J. Lee, of this city, and was held in the
 highest esteem by all who knew him for his
 retiring and very kindly manner. In his early
 days Canon Lee, like his brothers, was a promi-
 nent oarsman and a member of the Limerick
 Boat Club. In the seventies he rowed for Limerick
 Boat Club in a four which defeated a
 D.U.B.C. crack crew, stroked by Mr Justice
 Samuel. Canon Lee was a graduate of Trinity
 College, Dublin. He took his B.A. in 1879
 M.A. in 1890, and D.D. in 1891. He was
 ordained in 1886, and was curate of Liskmolesey,
 Co. Galway, till 1890. He was appointed curate
 of Nenagh in 1891, and became Rector of Ettagh
 and Killoolman, King's County, in 1896. In
 1911 he was made Canon of O'londegad in Killaloe
 Cathedral. He filled various diocesan offices, and
 was held in affectionate regard by his brother
 clergy and the laity of the parishes where his
 ministerial life was spent. The sympathy of very
 many friends is extended to his relatives in their
 bereavement. The funeral took place to-day at
 Brown (Ettagh).

MR A G DODD.

Many old friends in Limerick, where he spent
 several years as District Agent of the Great
 Western Railway Company of England, and
 subsequently in Cork, will regret to learn of the
 death of Mr A J Dodd in a nursing home
 at Bournemouth, where he had been
 for some little time past, after an opera-
 tion. Mr Dodd, who retired some years ago
 from the service, was a most genial and courteous
 gentleman, to know him was but to admire him
 for his many qualities of head and heart,
 and he endeared himself to all with whom
 he came in contact either in business or private
 life. He was for a time President of the Grafton
 Club, in Cork, and took a great interest in all
 classes of sport, and was a fine exponent of the
 game of billiards—at one time probably the best
 amateur player in Ireland. His remains will be
 brought to Cork for interment with his late wife.

Labour Executive Meets.

THE DOUGLAS TRIAL.

Evidence for Defence.

Accused Found Guilty--- Sentence.

Evidence for the defence in the Douglas trial was opened at the Old Bailey to-day. The accused was found guilty, and sentenced to six months in the second division. At the end of the sentence he was ordered to find surety to keep the peace, particularly towards Mr Churchill. Failing the finding of security, the accused to undergo a further six months imprisonment.

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE.

Council of Agriculture and Slaughter of Animals

Isolation Urged.

The question of foot and mouth disease was raised at a meeting in London to-day of the Council of Agriculture for England. A resolution was moved and seconded asking for the discontinuance of the slaughter of infected animals, it being argued that herds could be isolated and cured. Sir Robert Sanders, Minister for Agriculture, pointed out that if we did not slaughter we should have the disease always with us. They were expediting slaughter in b.d areas with good results. The department was consulting the highest medical authority regarding further measures.
