LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL

The Food Grant.

Mr B. Laffan, Chairman, presided at a special meeting of the County Council. A letter was read from the Minister of Agriculture in which the Government announced that out of a total grant of £162,000 due to local authorities for the 30th September, 1933 the amount to Limerick was £31,693 less £3,552 Local Commission.

The Secretary—We get £28,140 week.

The Chairman—How much is still due? The Secretary—£18,000. Under the grant our annual grant was £45,000 roughly.

A letter was read from the Minister that the amount provisionally allocated to Limerick Co. Council out of the total of £1,000,000 was £31,280 for the improvement of trunk roads in the county. Should the Government be prepared to grant the Ministry were prepared to grant the Council permission to raise by way of a loan of £8,370, but if they did not the extra part of this sum would be the grant of £1,280, bringing the total to £32,560.
