THE LATE MR EDMOND BARRY.

It is with the deepest sympathy we record the death of Mr Edmond Barry, of Conigar House, Murgret, and late of William street, Limerick. An old and highly respected citizen, the sad news of his death, after a very brief illness, will be received with feelings of sincere regret by a host of relatives and friends. The deceased, who had attained a very ripe old age, and came of a well-known East Limerick family, started life in the city over sixty years ago, where his business capabilities and acumen won him complete success. During his early days and throughout his whole career he took a deep and active interest in the welfare of his native city. For many years he represented the interests of the citizens as a member of the City Council, and his recognised ability in civic affairs brought him several public appointments, the duties of which he discharged in a manner that won for him the esteem and respect of all. One of the best known figures throughout the city and many counties, his strictly upright character, sincere and loyal disposition won him the admiration of a wide circle of acquaintances and friends. But it was only to those with whom he was intimately associated in private life that his sterling qualities were truly revealed. A loving husband, a kind father, he was deeply devoted to the interests of his wife and family, who have suffered an irreparable loss by his demise. In his last illness, his devoted children and grandchildren rendered him the consolation which he so much deserved, and fortified by the rites of the Holy Church he passed peacefully to his reward. The remains were removed on Sunday to the Parish Church, Murgret, and on Monday after Office and High Mass the interment took place in the family burial ground, Mt. St. Lawrence Cemetery.

ALLEGED ATTACK ON CIVIC GUARDS.

Charge Against Two Co. Limerick Men.

Acquittal and Disagreement.
Two young men named John Sheehan and Denis Wren were, at the Dublin Commission, yesterday charged with having, on October 23 last, attacked Civic Guards at Turriffulla Station, Newcastle West, Co Limerick, and fired a revolver at Sergeant McO'grie with intent to murder. The sergeant was wounded in the arm. Mr Carrigan, K.O., and Mr Dudley White, K.O. (instructed by the Chief State Solicitor), were prosecuted. Mr Joseph O'Connor (instructed by Mr Lavin, Newcastle West), appeared for Sheehan; and Mr James Comyn (instructed by Mr Fox) for Wren. The jury found Sheehan not guilty and he was discharged. In the case of Wren they failed to agree, and his trial was adjourned to the next Commission. He was allowed out on bail.
