CONFLICTS AT MILTOWN-MALBAY.

A Miltown-Malbay correspondent writing on Thursday says:—

Faction fights were freely indulged in at Miltown-Malbay last night. The opposing parties were followers of the Government from the town and Anti-Treatyites from the country, mostly ex-prisoners and their followers.

Crowds collected in different parts of the town and went about searching houses for their opponents. Many hand-to-hand encounters took place, and in some cases the participants were knocked down and badly treated, receiving nasty wounds.

Revolvers are said to have been drawn and questions asked as to "whether the flat or the bullet was required." Fortunately, however, no shooting took place. The Anti-Treaty section apparently got the worst of the conflict, and eventually retired.

The disturbance probably had its origin in the conduct of opponents of the Government, who on a number of occasions recently searched houses for demobilised soldiers and belaboured them.
