DEATH OF THE BISHOP OF ROSS.

We regret to record the death of the Most Rev Denis Kelly, D.D., Bishop of Ross, which took place yesterday morning at a Private Nursing Home in Dublin, where he had been under medical treatment for a few weeks past.

His Lordship who was Bishop of that diocese for twenty-seven years, was born at Kilnaneave near Nenagh, in 1852. When President of St. Flannan's College, Ennis, he was chosen Bishop of Ross. He took a deep interest in the welfare of the country, industrial, agricultural, and educational. He was an old member of the Agricultural Board, and one of the two members who represented Ireland on the Commission on the Poor Laws, set up by the British Government in 1906. He was beloved by the people of West Cork for the simplicity of his life an exceptionally valued one to the community and to Ireland.

DEATH OF MRS HANNA.

We regret to announce the death which occurred this morning at her residence, Greystones, of Mrs Hanna, widow of Mr Robert Hanna, 121 O'Connell Street, Limerick. The deceased lady, who was a native of this city, spent all her life here up to some years ago, when the family removed to Dublin. She attained the ripe age of 79 years.
