He attached no blame to the driver of

Fitzgerald stated that while cycling home he was run into by a motor car driven by Charles Cobill, to whom he attached no blame whatever, adding that he was as much to blame AS ADYODS

Dr W P Dundon, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, stated deceased was suffering from a lacerated wound of the right thigh, and injuries to the legs and hands. He was also suffering from less of blood and severe hadmorrhage, he oc lapsed on Thursday and died in a short time, death being due to sho k and haemorrhage.
