The case was dismissed.

Harry McCoy was charged with the theft of a bicycle value for £10, the property of a man named Michael J Bourke, Dublin. John Barrett was charged with receiving the machine, as was Francis Lyddy.

Sergeant O'Maheny gave evidence to the effect that in a month while passing through Roche's street he saw the bicycle, a Raleigh, being sold. He took the number of the machine, and at once communicated with the makers, when he ascertained that it had been sold to Mr Bourke, Dublin, who subsequently intimated that it was taken from him.

McCoy was convicted and sentenced to two months' imprisonment. The case against Barrett was dismissed, and the charge against Lyddy allowed stand for a week to enable him to produce a character from his employer.

Mr J S Giffney, solicitor, appeared for Barrett. Patrick Meaney was fined 10s and costs for exposing on the 1st April new milk for sale which contained 5.5 p.c. of added water.

Mr Ficed cautioned defendant to be more particular in future, and stated that he would impose heavier penalties in future cases that might be brought before him. Retailers, he said, should procure a warranty from the suppliers if they wished to protect themselves from being fined.

LIMERICK MOTOR COLLISION.

Fatal Termination.

An inquest was held at Barrington's Hospital on Thursday evening by Mr J S McNeice, City Coroner, on the body of John Fitzgerald, motor mechanic, Ballybrown, Kildimo, who succumbed to injuries in the institution that morning, sustained in a motor collision on the 27th April at Ferrybridge, Clirina.

Sergeant Silke conducted the inquiry, and evidence of identification was given by Patrick Fitzgerald, father of the deceased, who, he said, was a single man. He saw his son on the 28th ult. when he told him that while cycling home he ran into a motor car at Ferrybridge at 10 o'clock at night. He attached no blame to the driver of the car.

Sergeant Silke deposed to taking a statement from the deceased on the day following the occurrence. Fitzgerald stated that while cycling home he was run into by a motor car driven by Charles Cokill, to whom he attached no blame whatever, adding that he was as much to blame as anyone.

Dr W P Dundon, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, stated deceased was suffering from a lacerated wound of the right thigh, and injuries to the legs and hands. He was also suffering from loss of blood and severe haemorrhage, he collapsed on Thursday and died in a short time, death being due to shock and haemorrhage.

The jury found that deceased succumbed to injuries accidentally received in a motor collision.

LIMERICK COMPENSATION CLAIMS.

Before His Honor Judge Pigott yesterday, Eimold Roche, Tankardstown, Kilmac claimed in respect of destruction of an out on the 8th December last.

Mr J J Comyn, B L (instructed by Mr F solicitor) appeared for applicant, and Mr Kelly, B L (instructed by Mr P J O'Sul solicitor), for the County Council in oppositi

Applicant stated that on his farm was built a house, in which usually irregulars at Applicant had a son at the time serving in National Army. On the night in question rafters of the house were cut and a portion of slates was broken. Subsequently this portion of the house fell.

Mr P Ryan, Engineer, estimated the amount of damage at £27 10s, which sum the judge allowed.

The Manager of the Munster and Leinster Bank at Dromcollogher claimed £150, which was taken by two armed irregulars in August.

Mr M Binchy, B L (instructed by Mr Binchy solicitor), appeared for applicant, and Mr Power, County State Solicitor, appeared for State.

Mr N Cleary, manager of the Bank, stated on the afternoon of the occurrence he was out from his guard room, and on coming out he was met by two armed men whom he knew to be irregulars. Those men asked him for £300, for which he produced a cheque. He knew the cheque was not a correct one, and informed the men he could not give them £300, as he had but little money in the Bank. They then took £150, and said they wanted some to pay their men.

His Honor gave a decree for £150.

Martin W Carroll, Forfeast, claimed in respect of the burning of a house and contents, property, on the 4th January, 1922.

The same counsel appeared in the following cases:

Applicant stated that his sister died some time previous, and willed him her house and property. He let his sister-in-law live in the house. A party of men came on the night in question, and moved this lady and children into an outhouse and burned the residence. Fugitive belonging to himself and his sister-in-law, who was making a claim, was completely burned.

Both claims were adjourned for further particulars.

William P Murphy was awarded £280 damage to his hotel at Bruce on the 2nd August 1922, when a battle took place between National troops, who were in occupation, and the irregulars. Joseph P Hogan, Rathoanion, was awarded £175 for the seizure of a motor car by a party of armed men, on the 13th May, 1922.

John Burke and John Barrett, Broadford Limerick, were awarded £190 for the seizure of cattle from grazing lands at Ballingarry, during the month of May, 1922.

Captain Gascoigne was allowed £298 in respect of the burning of Killbane police barracks by irregulars, who went into occupation after National troops had left the building.
