BRITISH GOVERNMENT AND UNEMPLOYMENT.

When the House of Commons resumed the
 debate on the vote for the Ministry of Labour on
 Thursday, Sir Robert Horne moved a resolution on
 the vote by £100 in order to discuss the Govern-
 ment's policy in regard to unemployment. The
 Prime Minister and Mr A. Keith were among the
 principal speakers. Sir R. Horne's amendment
 was rejected by 310 votes to 252.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET REPORT. THURSDAY, 29th MAY.

Messrs Ganly, Sons & Co. report:—Numbers
 in market—Beasts, 2,198; decrease, 259. Sheep,
 9,122; decrease, 861.

There was a slow demand for all classes of cattle
 and a further drop in quotations. Top quality
 medium weights brought from 57s to 60s per cwt;
 good secondary class from 54s to 56s per cwt;
 other sorts from 53s back to 45s per cwt. There
 was practically no alteration in the demand for
 sheep and lambs, and a good clearance was
 effected on the basis of last week's quotations.

 Instruction Scheme for the Academic year
