It has been the case this year in England, where a shortage of potatoes was much more than usual, and consequently a keen competition existed for supplies from Ireland and other continental countries. All things considered, nothing should be left undone, and every effort should be made, by speaking to the farmer, to ensure a prolific crop from the Irish potato crop this year, and that prompt spraying is a most important measure in that direction.
