## DEATH OF THE REV. D. R. SHANAHAN, P.P.

The death, which we announce with regret, took  
 place at St. John's Hospital this morning, of the  
 Rev. Denis R. Shanahan, after an illness of a  
 month's duration. The deceased clergyman was  
 in his eightieth year, and seven years ago  
 he retired, owing to failing health, from  
 the pastoral charge of St. Mary's. He  
 was brother of the late Very Rev Dean  
 Shanahan, P.P., V.G., St. Munchin's, and of the  
 late Right Rev Monsignor Shanahan, P.P.,  
 Thornaby-on-Tees, and was ordained half a  
 century ago in All Hallows College, Co. Dublin.  
 His first curacy was Ballinacorney, and then St.  
 Michael's, after which he was appointed Parish  
 Priest of St. Patrick's. On the translation of the  
 late Most Rev Dr. Hallinan in 1898 to Newcastle  
 West, Fr. Shanahan was appointed to the pastoral  
 charge of St. Mary's, where he laboured until  
 1917. On his retirement he went to reside in  
 Dublin, and quite recently he returned to  
 Limerick. He was a zealous and devoted priest,  
 and was held in affectionate regard by the clergy  
 of the diocese and his parishioners, and by all  
 classes and orders in Limerick.

## INSURANCE AGENTS ON STRIKE.

The local agents of the Britannia Assurance  
 Company have come out on strike as a protest  
 against a reduction of pay. About six agents of  
 the Company are affected by the dispute, which,  
 it is stated, is not confined to Limerick. The  
 proposal to reduce remuneration is said to be in  
 violation of an agreement between the Company  
 and the National Amalgamated Union of Life  
 Assurance Workers.
