### DEATH OF MR JOHN J. MCCARTHY.

The death occurred this morning at his residence, Cecil street, after a long illness, patiently borne, of Mr John J. (Jack) McCarthy, formerly a superintendent of the Limerick Post Office, from which position he retired on pension some few years since. In his life he was prominent in the athletic and football fields, and, a member of an old Limerick family, he was held in high regard by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. His premature demise is sincerely regretted, and there is deep sympathy with his widow and young family in their great sorrow. The remains will be removed to St Michael's Catholic Church tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock. Funeral after 10 o'clock Mass on Thursday morning to Mount St Lawrence Cemetery.
