

Dillon, contractor for carrying out an extensive scheme of roads improvement in the city at an estimated expenditure of £50,000. The thoroughfares over which the heaviest traffic passes—the Dock-road and Mallow-street—have been re-laid in stone sett paving and reinforced concrete. Mr Dillon is now engaged in concreting O'Connell street, and within the last fortnight or so has laid down a considerable portion of the thoroughfare. When the entire scheme is completed it will give a new appearance to the city.

PROPOSED SHANNON HATCHERY.

At Limerick Fishery Board meeting, the following resolution was adopted on the motion of Mr McInerney:—"That in the opinion of this meeting, if the salmon and trout fisheries of the district are to be saved, much less advanced, that the time for the addition of a hatchery has arrived. That in connection with same a Committee be hereby formed consisting of seven members of the Board and three outsiders to co operate with them and whose united duty it will be to consider and decide on the best means of establishing such hatchery, and what otherwise may be done in the interest of the fisheries of the district."

DEATH OF MR STEPHEN J. M'CARTHY.

The death, which we record with regret, took place at his residence, Pary Square, on Thursday night, of Mr Stephen J. M'Carthy, after a rather brief illness, and in the seventieth year of his age. The late Mr M'Carthy was son of Mr Peter M'Carthy of this city, and brother of the late Mr Frank W. M'Carthy, Auctioneer. He was proprietor of the well-known Furniture Warehouse, O'Connell Street, and a gentleman who although never taking part in public affairs, always evinced a deep interest in the welfare of the city where he was highly esteemed and respected. He was a life long member and past President of the Society of St Vincent de Paul. The claims of the poor and needy, had in him at all times a devoted friend. Some ten years ago he retired from the business which has since been carried on by his sons. By his death an old and popular figure passes out of the life of the city, and in their bereavement the sympathy of the public is extended to his widow and family.

The remains will be removed to St Michael's Catholic Church at 8 o'clock this evening. Funeral on Sunday, at 2 p.m., to Mount St. Laurence Cemetery.
