**DEATH OF REV W O'SULLIVAN
C.C., ST MARY'S.**

We regret to state that the Rev. William O'Sullivan, C.C., St Mary's, Limerick, who met with with a serious accident while motor cycling near Kilmallock a fortnight ago, succumbed in St John's Hospital yesterday. The news of the untimely death of Father O'Sullivan has been received with sincere regret in the city and throughout the diocese generally. The deceased clergyman was in his thirty-sixth year, and was ordained twelve years ago in Maynooth. He was a native of Ardpatrick, and following his ordination he was for seven years on the Australian Mission. Five years ago he was recalled to his native diocese, and during that period he was attached to St Mary's Church, where he was very popular with the parishioners and citizens generally. Father O'Sullivan was an ardent follower of sport, and was a familiar figure at rugby and hurling fixtures in the city.

The Mayor presided at a meeting of the Municipal Technical Education Committee last night.
