

Many Passengers Injured.

Two White Star liners were caught in a hurricane in the Atlantic while making for New York last Tuesday night. The *Homeric*, a 34,350 ton boat, managed to outweather this storm with the loss of a lifeboat, but the *Arabic*, which is only half the size and 14 years older—having been built in 1908, with a tonnage of 16,786—suffered more severely.

The seas smashed to atoms the great plate glass window of the dining saloon, broke the windows of the first-class cabins and flooded the companionways. Twenty-four persons—mostly women—were injured, and eight ambulances were sent to the pier to meet the *Arabic* when she docked.

The *Arabic* sailed from Hamburg on August 16 and called at Southampton and Cherbourg on 18th August. She arrived at Halifax on the 25th, and left for New York. The hurricane in which she was caught swept the whole Atlantic seaboard yesterday. Ships took shelter in New York Harbour, which was crowded with vessels. The seas were mountainous, and a tidal wave is believed to have caused many casualties. The *Arabic* appears to have caught the full force of the storm.

DEATH OF AN OLD CITIZEN

We regret to record the death of Mr James McInerney, ship-carpenter, 76 Henry-street, which took place last Saturday evening at his residence, at an advanced age. The deceased belonged to an old Limerick family who for generations have been connected with the shipping of the port. He himself was very highly esteemed by all who knew him, and his demise, after an illness of some duration, removes an old and respected personality. There is deep sympathy with the late Mr McInerney's relatives in their bereavement. The funeral, which took place on Monday for Mount St Laurence, was large and representative. The chief mourners included Mr Joseph McInerney (son) and deceased's grandson and several other relatives. The clergy present were Father Dwane, Adm., and Father Carroll, C.C., St. Michael's.

CO. LIMERICK LABOURER'S DEATH.

Knocked Down by a Bull.

Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, and a jury held an inquest at the County Infirmary on Michael Kelleher, Knockfenare, Brurea, who died in the hospital on Saturday morning from injuries received by being knocked down by a bull at Charleville Station on the 15th instant.

Evidence of identification was given by Cornelius Carroll, uncle of the deceased; and Denis O'Sullivan stated that on the date in question the deceased had a bull at Charleville Railway Station. The witness left for a short time, and when he returned he found Kelleher lying on the ground, and the bull gone. The deceased stated that he was thrown by the animal and dragged a distance. He was removed to Croom Hospital, and subsequently to the County Infirmary.

The medical evidence was that death was due to hæmorrhage, and the jury returned a verdict accordingly.
