Board of Health Adjourns.

The meeting of the Clare Board of Health, at which Mr John D. Moloney, chairman, presided, was adjourned as a tribute of respect to the memory of their late colleague, Mr Ml O'Grady. The resolution of sympathy and the adjournment of the meeting were moved by Mr Ml Hehir, who referred to the late Mr Ml O'Grady as being one of the ablest and most earnest representatives of public life in Clare. Mr J. McGrath seconded the resolution, and, with the Chairman, joined in the tribute to the late Mr O'Grady. The Kildysart District Council, of which the late Mr O'Grady was chairman, was also adjourned, after a resolution of sympathy had been passed. The members present also decided to send a wreath to be placed on his grave as a further tribute of respect to their late colleague.

FUNERAL OF MRS F. McNAMARA.

The remains of the late Mrs Francis McNamara were interred yesterday in Mount St. Laurence Cometary. At 3 o'clock the funeral, which was very largely attended by the citizens and people from Rathkeale and district, left St. Michael's Catholic Church, whither the remains were removed on Thursday evening after the arrival of the 9 o'clock train from Dublin. The extent of the cortege was a fitting tribute of respect to the memory of the deceased, and expressive of the sympathy felt for her husband and family in their bereavement.
