# Infant's Body in Parcel.

An inquest was held at Barrington's Hospital last evening by Mr J. S. McNetos, City Coroner, and a jury on the body of an unknown female infant found on the bank of the Abbey River yesterday.

Patrick Herbert, labourer, deposed to finding the body on the river bank opposite the Athlunkard Boat Club. It was wrapped in a parcel and had the appearance of being in the water for some time. He informed the Civic Guard at Mary street of the discovery.

Sergeant McGee, Mary street, stated that the body was enclosed in a brown paper and a pleos of a flour bag, which bore no inscription. He had it removed to the Margue of Barrington's Hospital.

Dr J. G. Helmes deposed to making a postmortem in conjunction with Dr W. P. Dundon, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital. The body was decomposed and appeared to have been in the water for some time. Death was caused by neglect at birth.

The jury returned a verdict accordingly.
