## DEATH OF MR. T. B. LILLIS.

### Munster and Leinster Bank.

We regret to announce the death of Mr T. B. Lillis, General Manager and Director of the Munster and Leinster Bank, which occurred yesterday at his residence Carrig, Cobh. The sad news has been received with great regret in commercial circles in Dublin, Cork, and Limerick, where his remarkable business capacity and outstanding ability as a highly successful financier were thoroughly recognised and appreciated. A man of indomitable energy and unswerving rectitude, he raised the Munster and Leinster Bank to the highest place that could possibly be attained by any similar concern in the country.

## DEATH OF MRS. E. EBRILL.

We regret to announce the death, which occurred at her residence, Summerville Cottage, South Circular Road, this afternoon, of a highly esteemed and well-known lady, Mrs Elizabeth Ebrill, at an advanced age. She was the widow of the late Mr William Ebrill, wool merchant, Limerick, and mother of Messrs. Ebrill, auctioneers, and Mr C. Ebrill, solicitor. She was connected with several families in city and county, and was a lady who throughout her long life was very actively associated with charitable works in this city. She was a Vice-President of the Ladies' Branch of the Society of St Vincent De Paul, and a member of the Committee of the Lying-in Hospital, Bedford Row. In her day she took an active part in the organisation of the Nurses for the city hospitals, and she also assisted Mrs O'Brien, South Hill, in the establishing of the milk depot for the city poor. Indeed the extent of her unostentatious work for the poor and the distressed will never be adequately known, and her demise removes from them a true and warm hearted and life-long friend. In private life, Mrs Ebrill was very highly esteemed for her very kindly and retiring disposition, and the news of her demise, after an illness of some duration, will occasion widespread sympathy for her family in the bereavement that has come to them. ## THE LATE MR E H COLLOPY.

An inquest was held at 18 Pery Square, yesterday morning, by Mr J S McNeice and a jury on the body of Mr Edward H Collopy who was found dead in bed on Thursday morning at his residence. Evidence of identification was given by Thomas G Wilson, brother-in-law of the deceased, and Sergeant O'Reilly, Edward street Civic Guard station, deposed to finding the body after forcing the door of the house. The medical testimony, as given by Dr F G Kennedy who in conjunction with Dr J F Devane made an examination, showed that death was due to rupture of a blood vessel of the brain. The jury returned a verdict accordingly.

### The Funeral.

The remains of the late Mr Edward H. Collopy were interred this morning in St Munchin's Cemetery. At 10 o'clock the funeral left St. Michael's Church, Barrington-street, whither the remains had been removed from his residence, 16 Pery Square, the previous evening, and was very largely attended by the citizens. It was a well-earned tribute of respect to the memory of one who had been connected with business in the city for a long number of years, and expressed the sympathy felt for his widow and daughter, as well as other relatives, in their bereavement. During the progress of the cortege to St Munchin's the blinds of the Protestant Young Men's Association were fully drawn, the late Mr Collopy being a member of that institution for a considerable period, and took an active part in its welfare. The blinds in many business premises were also drawn.

The chief mourners were—Mr George Collopy, Dublin (brother); Mr W. P. Collopy and Mr R. J. Collopy (nephews); Mr T. G. Wilson, Mr R. Baker, and Mr J. Keenan (brothers-in-law); and Mr J. Stewart, Dublin (relative). Mr F. J. Clevee, Mr T. Ryan, and Mr S. Johnston were amongst the general body of mourners. The Rev. Chancellor Swain officiated.
