COUNTY LIMERICK MURDER.

Old Man's Fate.

Wounds Believed Inflicted with Spade.

"Wilful murder by some person or persons unknown," was the verdict returned at an inquest on Saturday evening concerning the death of John Brazili, aged about 88 years, who died on Saturday from the effects of wounds inflicted under mysterious ofreumstances on Thursday night at his residence, mid-way on the road between Kilfinane and Kilmallock.

Brozil carried on a trade in groceries and sundries, and was last seen alive wh n attending to his business towards 9 p.m. on Thursday.

At ten c'clock, when a customer called for bread, he found the old man lying unconscious, with five wounds in the head. The yard attached to the out-offices was sprinkled with blood, and a little fowl-house or store-house presented the appearance of a shambler.

A spade, with which it is believed the wounds were inflicted, were found bearing traces of blood.

The viotim never recovered consciousness, and succumbed to his it juries on Saturday.

Little light was thrown on the tragedy at the inquest. From the evidence it appears that no person was seen about Brazill's residence at the time the murder must have been committed.

The medical evidence showed that the old man's injuries could have been tofficted with the spade found at his resid, nor.

The Coroner, Dr Cleary, Hospital, expressed the hope that the perpetrators would be traced. It was very sad, he said, that such a orime should be committed in a civilized country.

The jury added a rider to their verdict ex-pressing the hope that the people would aid the authorities to find the guilty party.

Superintendent Maguire. Limerick, Inspector Fleming, and the Civic Guard force are pursuing inquiries into the affair.
