TIPPERARY MILK FACT

Condensing Re-Start

For the first time since July, 1922, an open factory from the chimney stack at Tipperary on Wednesday last (see "Clogmel Chronicle." In May, 1922, it took over control of the concern, and in the same year it was burned down, and several hundred hands were thrown out of employment.

Mr. A. O'Shaughnessy, T. D., chairman and managing director of the new company in an interview stated that for the past three years condensed milk business the world over deteriorated very considerably owing to that huge stocks of condensed milk were after the war by the belligerent Governments. These stocks were unloaded on the markets, and completely upset the manufacture of condensed milk. When the new company took over possession on 1st March last, Mr. O'Shaughnessy, they immediately set afoot a revival of the condensed milk business, and are thankful to say, with very good results that the business has progressed so rapidly we find it necessary to start condensing factory, and the company are engaged in preparations for the rebuilding of a factory that was burned down, and which was equipped with the latest and most modern machinery.

COUNTY CLARE KIDNAP

Motor Driver Sent for Trial

At Ennis District Sessions on Friday, circumstances under which Stephen Markham was kidnapped to prevent him attending the meeting of the District Council, of which he was a member, were related in a prosecution against a man named Bernard McNamara, O'Connell, Ennis, who was charged with aiding and abetting with others to prevent Mr. Markham attending the District Council meeting on Saturday, September, for the purpose of voting in favour of a motion to elect a member to that body and to elect Mr. Markham as Chairman.

Superintendent Carroll prosecuted. Mr. H. O'B. Moran, solicitor, Limerick, appeared for the accused.

Mr. Markham, in his evidence, said that on the evening of the 1st September, he was on his way to the meeting with another man when a motor car drove up to him. He was driven by accused, with whom were two other men. Witness was ordered into the car and the men at the point of a revolver, pressed by one man. He was driven away in the car to Newmarket-on-Fergus, ten miles from Ennis, where he stood the men drinks at Newmarket, and then drove him to Quin village. He was ten miles from Ennis, to which he walked, not knowing the armed men in the car.
