CO. RATE COLLECTOR ARRESTED

On Charge of Embezzlement.

At a special court in William-street Civic Guard Station, Limerick, this evening, before Mr P. O'Halloran, P.C., Peter O'Shaughnessy, of Churchtown, Newcastle West, was charged with embezzling a sum of £3,032 8s 1d, the money of the Limerick County Council, while employed as a rate collector to that body for the Rathkeale Collection district, between January and August of this year.

Superintendent Slavin, Newcastle West, gave evidence of arresting the accused on a warrant at his residence early this morning. He applied for a remand in order to enable him to prosecute his enquiries.

Mr O'Halloran remanded the prisoner to the next District Court to be held at Newcastle West.

DEATH OF REV CANON DICKSON.

We regret to record the death of the Rev Canon D. E. L. Dickson, formerly of this Diocese, which took place on Monday last at Hollybrook, Lisnaskea, Co Fermanagh. He was the last surviving son of the late Lieutenant-Colonel Dickson. Canon Dickson graduated in 1861, at Trinity College, Dublin, where he was a Non-Foundation Scholar, Berkeley Gold Medallist, and Prizeman in Biblical, Greek, and Ecclesiastical History. He was ordained in 1862, and in 1865 was appointed Canon. In 1867, after five years' service as incumbent of Garvary, he became Vicar of Killeedy with Killalathan, and held that appointment until 1916. He was a very kindly and affable gentleman, and many old friends in Limerick will regret to hear of his demise.

DEATH OF MRS M. GRANT.

We regret to have to announce the death, which took place at her residence, Clareview, South Circular Road, Limerick, this morning of Mrs Mary Grant, after an illness of considerable duration. The deceased lady was wife of Mr Peter A. Grant, representative of Messrs W. Clarke and Co, tobacconists, William street, and well-known in commercial circles in Munster. She was a very amiable lady, of a most kindly disposition, and enjoyed the friendship of a large number of friends, who regret her demise, and extend the utmost sympathy to her husband and family in their bereavement. The late Mrs Grant was a native of Lismore, and has two daughters nuns in the Community of the Faithful Companions, one at Laurel Hill, Limerick, and the other in Brittany.

The remains will be removed to-morrow (Friday) evening at 7 o'clock to St Michael's Catholic Church. The funeral takes place on Saturday morning for Mount St Laurence immediately after Requiem High Mass at 10.30 a.m.
