THREATENED STRIKE:

Of Dublin Publicans' Assistants

By a majority of five to one the Dublin publicans' assistants have decided to go on strike. The decision was taken at a ballot in Banba Hall, Rutland square, on Sunday, when 1,175 members of the Grocers and Vintners' Assistants' Association recorded their votes. If, as now seems probable, the public-houses of Dablin are to close, some 1,400 assistants and apprentices will

The strike is being declared as a result of the refusal of the publicans to grant certain demands which were made some time ago. These include a flat rate of 653 per week for qualified assistants, 75s per week for charge hands, the inauguration of the living out system, and the employment of none but certified members of the Union in the filling of all ordinary vacancies.

Toe Publican Assistants' Union has decided to call a strike on December 2nd unless the demands for higher wages and improved conditions are

granted.
