PROPOSED NEW FORTH BRIDGE.

proposal to erect a road bridge over the
 Forth, in proximity to the existing rail-
 bridge, was discussed at a conference of local
 bodies, held in Edinburgh. The intention of
 the promoters was to construct a suspension bridge
 of spans, each of 2,400 feet, at an estimated
 cost of four millions, in order to facilitate motor
 traffic along the East Coast, and to avoid the wide
 detour which, at present, must be made through
 the Firth of Forth.

 cattle, except for really tip-top finish; quotations
 moved in favour of buyers. At the close of the
 market several lots had failed to meet purchasers.

 cwt, and for choice quality up to 56s per cwt;
 good secondary sorts from 48s to 51s per cwt;
 other classes from 47s back to 42s per cwt. Fat
 bulls and cows met a worse trade at lower prices.
 There was a keen demand for best lots of hoggets
 and wethers at improved quotations. Other
 classes more easily exchanged, and a good
 clearance effected.
