REPARATIONS COMMISSION.

New British Delegate.

London, Monday.

The following announcement was issued from 10 Downing-street to-night:—

The King has been pleased to approve the appointment of Lord Blanesburgh to be the principal British delegate on the Reparation Commission in succession to Lord Bradbury. The duties to be performed by the principal British delegate will be of such nature as to require high legal and judicial experience. It is understood that in future the attendance of the principal delegates on the Reparation Commission in Paris will only be necessary at intervals.

Lord Blanesburgh will continue to hold the office of Lord of Appeal in Ordinary and to discharge the duties of that office.

GRAND CENTRAL.

"Dixie Minstrels."

There were crowded audiences at the Grand Central last night, especially at the second house, to renew acquaintance with the Dixie Minstrel troupe. Every part of the house was taxed to its utmost, and a very cordial reception was accorded the Minstrels, whose programme was varied and bright. It contained all the usual equipment of artistes of this brand, and was a refined and pleasant show throughout. The tenor and baritone songs were rendered with expression and fulness, particularly that ever-popular ballad "Nirvana," and during the performances encores were frequent. The dancing was graceful and novel, being traditional of the palmiest days of these popular entertainments, while the choruses were well balanced and tuneful. In the domain of sketch the Minstrels were clever, and repartee of a bright and witty character was a feature of the entertainment. It was, on the whole, a taking entertainment, and during this week the Dixies should draw large audiences to the Central.

THREE NEW CUNARDERS.

To Enter Service During The Season.

Three big new Cunarders will be commissioned during the coming spring and summer. They are the "Orinthia," "Alaunia" and "Ascania." The "Orinthia" of 20,000 tons, a sister ship of the "Franconia" class, will carry first, second and third class passengers. She is destined for the Liverpool, New York service, and will make her first sailing next August. She will also spend a large part of her time cruising, having already been scheduled for a trip Round the World commencing in October next. The "Alaunia" and "Ascania" each of 14,000 tons carrying cabin and third class passengers will be engaged in the Company's Canadian Service.

SHANNON FISHERY ACTION.

In the Chancery Division, before Mr Justice Meredith, in an action in which Samuel Whip is plaintiff, and Anthony Mackey defendant, counsel applied on behalf of the plaintiff for certain particulars. The action is brought for a declaration that an agreement permitting defendant to moor eel tanks to plaintiff's island in the river Shannon was determined by a notice to quit for breach of a covenant to pay rent, and that the licence is no longer of effect, and for an order restraining defendant from continuance to moor the tanks. The defendant, in his defence, alleged that he had been prevented, while still paying rent, from using the tanks by defendant's workmen and servants, and that accounted for the non-payment.

Plaintiff, in reply, denied there had been any such interference. He served notice on the defendant for particulars of the acts complained of, and defendant having failed to deliver them, plaintiff now sought to compel delivery, or, in default, have that plea in the defence struck out.

The application was granted.

Mr Michael Binohy (inst. acted by Mr Blood-Smyth) appeared for the plaintiff.
