### DEATH OF COLONEL H. T. BROWN.

W rage the reser' the death of Colonel Henry T. Brown, which occurred at his residence, 6 Glentworth Street, on Monday. The deceased gentleman, who had reached an advanced age, had been in failing health for some time past. He was a member of an old County Limerick family, and owned landed property near Rathkeale.
