Rev. Dean Hackett, who was present in court, expressed surprise when he heard of the boys being implicated in such a serious matter.

They were youths of good character, and their father was an industrious man.

The defendants told the Court that they were induced by a boy named Coleman to take pens, pencils, and chocolates from the shop. Flood said, having regard to the good character given of the boys, he would allow them their parents giving bail for their future behaviour, provided they each paid 10s compensation for the loss incurred to the owner.

McInerney was sent to prison for three years, his brother Joseph was committed to a reformatory for three years, and James Coleman also committed to a reformatory for five years or breaking into Mr Harold's pawn office, street, on the night of the 21st instant.
