PERMANENT SUMMER TIME FOR BRITAIN.

Answering Sir H. Brittain, in the House of Commons, Sir W. Joyson Hicke said the Government would allow a free vote on the private member's Bill making summer time permanent, and would adopt the Bill, and carry it through as a Government measure.

The "Daily News" says—The Government's decision to adopt Colonel Lambert Ward's Summer Time Bill, if on Friday it should receive a second reading on a free vote of the House of Commons, makes it almost certain that the beneficial reform embodied in this measure will at last become the established law of the land. This Bill, when it is passed, will do something—very simply but very surely—to widen the area of a beneficial influence, and sweeten the lives of millions of city toilers. It is the duty of members of all parties to ensure by their votes on Friday that no group of mischief makers is given another chance to wreck the bill.
