## POTEEN IN WEXFORD.

### Imprisonment and Fine.

James Coady, Corrigeen, Rathmore, was, at Enniscorthy on Thursday, sentenced to two months' imprisonment with hard labour, and fined £10, or in default a further two months' imprisonment, for being in possession of an illicit still and poteen. This is the first poteen case to be brought in County Wexford for thirty years. The magistrate said that if the defendant had not borne a good character hitherto, he would have inflicted a heavier penalty to check the introduction of the poteen traffic into the county.
