DEATH OF MISS NELLIE O'BRIEN.

News reached Limerick to-day of the death in London this morning of Miss Nellie G'Brien. The sad intelligence was communicated to Mrs Vere O'Brien, Monere, Foynes, by Mrs A B Cane, Elm Park Gardene, London, a sister of the deceased, with whom she had been on a visit. Although it was known that Miss O'Brien had been in somewhat indifferent health for some time past, there was nothing to cause apprehension, and her unexpected demise is all the more poignant. CLARE FARMER'S TRAGIC DEATH.

THE LATE DR. MELVILLE,

The following is taken from the "Hants and Berks Gazette" relative to the death of Dr Melville, son of Mr E. F. M. Melville, who up to a few years ago was manager of the Provincial Bank of Ireland in Limerick : -

We deeply regret to record the death of Dr Gordon Moncreiff Melville, which took place at a nursing home in London on Tuesday following a severe operation. Dr Melville had suffered for a long time from luternal complaints which had previously necessitated more than one operation. and it is greatly deplored that he has at length succumbed. He was 42 years of age. The deepest sympathy will be felt throughout the town and neighbourhood with Mrs Melville and her two children in their irreparable loss.

Dr Melville came to Basingstoke in 1909 and took over the practice of Dr F. A. Stokes. was a graduate of the University of Edinburgh and held the degrees of Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery and of Doctor of Medicine. In the examination for the latter degree he gained honours. He also studied in America. Before coming to Basingstoke he held the appointments of resident bouse surgeon and physician and cenior house surgeon (Ear and Throat Department) at the Royal Infirmary, Edic burgh; acting surgeon at the Co. Antrim Infirmary, Ireland; and agaistant medical superintendent at New Saughton Hall for the insane under Sir John Batty Take, M.D.

Highly skilled as a general practitioner, Dr Melville applied himself with unremitting zeal to his noble calling, which perhaps more than any other exacts from its members unceasing study and practice if they mean to keep in the van of medical science, and his loss to the profession is unquestionably a severe one. A year ago he was appointed senior clinical assistant at the Great Ormond Street Hospital for tick children, and had regularly visited the hospital and carried out his duties there up to the time of his last illness A year or so ago Dr Melville removed from his house in Church Equare—now occupied by his partner, Dr H, Radford Potter—to Achley Lodge.

By Dr Melville's death the Basingstoke and District Photographic Society loses a President who was keenly interested in photography and chief object sh was himself a very successful amateur in that branch of art, He was also an active and enthusiastic supporter of the Basingstoke Amateur Dramatic Society, with which he was officially associated as hop, treasurer. Among other ways in which he helped in the service of the local community it may be mentioned that he was for some years a churchwarden and latterly a sidesman of St. Mary's, Eastrop, and he was also a manager of St. John's School. In his younger days Dr Melville was a fine all-round athiete. A famous hootey player, for some years he played for Scolland, and for a time he captained the Scottish side. He was also a University Blue for Rugby, cricket, and running; and also distinguished himself at golf. He was, moreover, a first-rate that and a keen croquet player and fisherman.
