## DROWNING ACCIDENT IN GRAND CANAL.

The body of a man named Timothy C'Connell, of Lansdowne, Limerick, was taken out of the Grand Canal at Cloniara early yesterday morning. The deceased, who was a married man, was employed at Lansdowne Condensed Milk Factory, was a carpenter. He had been missing from his home since the 26th of last month, when he went for a walk to Cioniara. It is presumed that he returned by the Canal bank, and must have fallen into the water accidentally.

#### The Inquest.

An inquest was held at Cloniara last evening by Mr P. Callor, Coroner for Clare, and a jury lato the ofroumstances under which death occurred.

Supt. Mooney, Killaloe, conducted the enquiry and the evidence went to show that deceased was at Clonlara on the 26th ultime. Before he left the villige he as to the best way of getting back to Limerick, enquired and was told by the public road. He, however, took the canal bank route, and must have fallen into the water close to where the body was

The medical testimony showed that there were no marks of violence anterior to death, but that the body was badly affected by coming into contact with the propeller of one of the canal steamers.
