### A TOUR ROUND THE WORLD.

Towards the end of the year a cruise around the world, of 34,850 miles will be undertaken by the "Empress of Scotland," the Flag Ship of the Canadian Pacific Fleet. The cruise will occupy 157 days of which 91 days will be spent afloat, and 66 ashore. Christmas will be spent in the Holy Land, and New Year's Eve in Cairo. Arrangements have been made that the twenty countries included in the itinerary will be visited under the most pleasant weather conditions, and when the respective seasons are at their height.
