FUNERAL OF MR JAMES McCLATCHY.

The remains of the late Mr James McClatchy,
of Bloomfield, Castleconnell, and 37 O'Connell
street, Limerick, who died in London on the 1st
instant, arrived here yesterday by the 10.15 a.m.
train from Rosslare, the funeral taking place
immediately afterwards for St Mary's Cathedral.
It was large and representative of the business
interests of the city, including also residents
from Castleconnell, where the deceased, as in
Limerick, was highly esteemed. His premature
demise has evoked deep sympathy with Mr
McClatchy's widow and relatives in their sorrow.
The blinds of the Chamber of Commerce, P.Y.M.A,
and numerous business houses were drawn during
the funeral.
